April 27th 2008: THE SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Christ will not leave His Church, but promises her the Holy Spirit

The Forty Days' teaching by our Lord to his Apostles after his resurrection are drawing to a close. In today's Gospel Jesus continues to prepare them for life after He has gone away from the earth for good, or at least for the remainder of their lifetimes. So He tells them, to reassure them of His continuing, though hidden, presence in their midst that He "will not leave them orphans, but will come back to them".

In what does this "coming back" consist? First, it is through the forth-coming outpouring of the Holy Spirit, whom the Apostles know because "He is with you, He is in you". At Pentecost, that inner presence will become a living mutual awareness between Our Lord and His Apostles. Then the Holy Spirit will bring them to understand that Jesus is one with His heavenly Father, and that through this same Spirit Jesus and the Father will truly live in

the Apostles' hearts and minds. Secondly, from the day of Pentecost onwards, the Holy Spirit will make Christ visible to the Apostles in a wholly new way. Jesus says that "in a short time the world will no longer see me; but you will see me, because I live and you will live." Those who do not believe in Christ do not see Him. To them He is a figure either from legend or from ancient history. But, to us who believe, Jesus is not only alive, He is present within his Church, and He is not merely invisibly present, but truly visible to us, not with the eyes of our bodies, but with the eyes and understanding of faith and trust in Him, born of the life of prayer and the Sacraments. This is not mere imaginative language or wishful thinking – it is **reality**, but only through the gift of the Holy Spirit who is alive in the Church and who makes all of us, the Church's members, alive with the risen life of the Lord Jesus. In this way our Lord not only prepares the Apostles for His forthcoming return to the Father at His Ascension, which we will celebrate this coming week, but also prepares us for His continuing presence among us in the Holy Spirit whose enlivening outpouring we will once again celebrate with great joy and thankfulness at Pentecost.

Cardinal Newman's miracle is accepted!

It is with great joy and excitement that we have heard the news from Rome in only the last few days that the team of medical experts entrusted with the investigation of Deacon Jack Sullivan's Healing in Boston have come to their final conclusion that this cure is indeed beyond the explanation of science, and that it can be attributed to the Will of Almighty God granted through the intercession of Cardinal Newman. All that remains now before his beatification can be announced is that the Pope's board of theological experts must decree that there is nothing contrary to the Catholic faith in Cardinal Newman's writings, which has already effectively been established over the last thirty-five years of the Process of the Cause. We hope to update you with news about the Beatification as soon as possible, and plans to travel to Rome for it.

Monday April 28th: Monday of Easter Week 6. (White). Optional memoria of St Peter Chanel, Priest & Martyr. (Red); or of St Louis Mary de Montfort, Priest. (White)

• Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.

St Peter Chanel (1803-41) A French priest, he joined the Marist Missionaries and was sent as the leader on a mission to Futuna in the South Pacific, where cannibalism had only recently been outlawed. He was very successful, but so much so that the local ruler, Niulikili became jealous, especially when his own son converted. He laid a trap when Fr Peter was alone and he was clubbed to death. He is the proto-martyr of the South Seas.

St Louis Mary de Montfort (1673-1716) A French priest, he dedicated his life to the spiritual care of the sick and poor. Pope Clement XI named him "Apostolic Missionary" and with (Blessed) Louisa Mary Trichet, he founded the Daughters of Wisdom. He was deeply devoted to Our Lady and travelled through Western France teaching the mystery of Eternal Wisdom, the Incarnation, and devotion to Our Lord, through Our Lady.

Tuesday April 29th: Feast of St Catherine of Siena, Virgin, Doctor of the Church & Patron of Europe. (White)

• Benediction at 8 p.m. Brothers of the Little Oratory meet after Benediction

St Catherine of Siena (1347-80) A Dominican she worked with the poor and became renowned for converting hardened criminals. She was influential as a mystic and author and was an adviser to Pope Gregory XI and Urban VI. But her greatness ultimately resided in her holiness and passionate concern for the salvation of souls.

Wednesday April 30th: Wednesday of Easter Week 6. Optional memoria of St Pius V, Pope. (White)

St Pius V (1504-72) A Dominican, he was elected Pope in 1566, but remained a devout mendicant friar in his personal life. As Pope, he fiercely defended the Church and her teachings: He excommunicated Elizabeth I of England, combated the loose discipline of the Roman curia, and insisted on strict adherence to the decrees of the Council of Trent.

Thursday May 1st: Thursday of Easter Week 6. (White) Optional memoria of St Joseph the Worker. (White) Ascension Thursday (40th day after Easter)

• Ascension Thursday (see below): Solemn High Latin Mass in the Extraordinary Rite (1962 Missal) at 8 p.m.

St Joseph the Worker: Introduced by Pope Pius XI in response to the secular Labour Day, we remember that Our Lord was not ashamed to be known as the "son of Joseph the Carpenter" and honour St Joseph as patron of the dignity and value of human work.

Friday May 2nd: St Athanasius, Bishop & Doctor of the Church. (White)

• May Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Athanasius (c. 296-Bishop of Alexandria for 46 years, he spent much of the time in exile due to his fierce stand against Arianism. Cardinal Newman was devoted to him and described him as "...that extraordinary man...a principal instrument after the apostles by which the sacred truths of Christianity have been conveyed and secured to the world".

- Mass at 8 a.m. and 11 a.m.
- Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 8.30 to 10.45 a.m.
- Benediction at 10.45 a.m.
- Confessions from 10.55 a.m. to 12 noon and from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass

First Mass of Sunday: The Ascension, at 5.45 p.m.

St Philip preached the Gospel in Asia Minor and is believed to have been martyred at Phyrigia. James, known as "the Lesser" to distinguish him from "the Greater", St. John's brother, became Bishop of Jerusalem and was the first of the Apostles to be martyred.
