THE SECOND COMING

If you are **not** puzzled by today's Gospel, then read it again carefully! What is our Lord saying? In the passage which comes immediately before the point where today's Gospel reading begins, Our Lord was talking to the Apostles about the destruction of Jerusalem and of the Temple. This is what He refers to by "the time of distress" at the very beginning of today's passage.

This "time of distress", culminating in the sack of Jerusalem, took place as Our Lord had prophesied within a short number of years of His own death. It was in 70 A.D. that Titus, later to be the Roman Emperor, sacked Jerusalem and obliterated the Temple so thoroughly that it has never been rebuilt since. In fact, since there is now an Islamic mosque standing on the site, rebuilding the Jewish Temple would be, to say the very least, highly controversial.

"In those days, after the time of distress", begins Our Lord today. Here He is talking about something that will happen after the

destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem—a great cataclysm, or destruction of everything—not just a human event, but one that includes the whole visible cosmos: earth, moon and stars. He doesn't say how long after the destruction of Jerusalem this will take place. In fact, at the end of the reading He says: "As for that day or hour, nobody knows it...not the Son, no one but the Father".

Why does Our Lord, who is the Son of God, say that He does not know something the Father knows? Ancient heretics like Arius, who denied the divinity of Christ, used this text to demonstrate that Christ could not be God if He was ignorant about something that was known by God. Yet though this seems at first a strong argument, it is in reality a mistaken interpretation of Our Lord's meaning.

The mysterious nature of Our Lord's words is to do with the way in which the future is not pre-determined in every detail. God has given human beings the ability to influence the unfolding and outcome of events, even great ones. Some aspects of the future remain obscure because of our free will. By our own choices we can act either to help or to hinder God's cause in the world. Of course, in the end God is supreme. His Will shall prevail over all things in the end. Yet in this time between Our Lord's first coming and the end of the world, God deliberately allows all mankind to play a real part in the progress of history towards its final end, which is the Second Coming of the Son of God and the Last Judgement. Our Lord, thinking and speaking as true man, says that there are things which cannot humanly be known before they happen, since the free will of human beings as yet unborn will be a factor in their shaping. God's own knowledge of things yet to come is beyond the power of any human mind to know or express. It is this knowledge of the end of everything, as it is known only by God the Father's divine omniscience, of which Christ speaks here — and explains to the Apostles that, humanly speaking. He cannot know it. Yet it is highly significant that Our Lord knows that the Father knows it. If Christ's knowledge were merely human, He could not know that fact or reveal it to us.

So when He goes on to explain that we can know certain aspects of the future as we know that summer is near when the leaves come out, Our Lord is once more speaking of the events leading to the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 A.D. It is this destruction which He foretells will take place "before this generation has passed away".

What our Lord has done is to talk first about both the *near* future (the destruction of Jerusalem) and the *distant* future (the destruction of the sun, moon and stars), Then after mentioning those two kinds of future event He goes back again. He contrasts the kind of event which men will be able to see coming just as they can see the seasons changing, with the final cataclysm of all visible creation, of which no one but the Father knows the precise time. It is this visible creation to which Our Lord refers in the phrase "heaven and earth shall pass away". He does not mean the *invisible* heaven where God lives for ever with His angels and saints in infinite glory. That heaven, like Our Lord's words, will never pass away.

St Margaret of Scotland (d. 1093) Queen of Scotland, she was renowned for her piety and charity to all, and also her encouragement in education and the arts.

St Edmund of Abingdon (d. 1242) Archbishop of Canterbury, he was a holy man and a visionary. Henry III objected to Edmund's adherence to Rome and he died in exile.

St Gertrude (d.1301) A mystic, she had great devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which she has fostered throughout the Church by her writings, still of great interest.

He was renowned for the care of the oppressed, and sick.

YEAR FOR PRIESTS—a reflection by Pope Benedict XVI:

Explaining to his parishioners the importance of the sacraments, St John Vianney would say: "Without the Sacrament of Holy Orders, we would not have the Lord. Who put him there in that tabernacle? The priest. Who welcomed your soul at the beginning of your life? The priest. Who feeds your soul and gives it strength for its journey? The priest. Who will prepare it to appear before God, bathing it one last time in the blood of Jesus Christ? The priest, always the priest. And if this soul should happen to die [as a result of sin], who will raise it up, who will restore its calm and peace? Again, the priest... After God, the priest is everything! ... Only in heaven will he fully realize what he is". These words, welling up from the priestly heart of the holy pastor, might sound excessive. Yet they reveal the high esteem in which he held the sacrament of the priesthood.
