ST JOSEPH AND OUR LADY

Each year on this last Sunday of Advent, the Gospel focuses on our Blessed Lady as she awaits the moment when she will bring forth the Son of God into the world. Today we hear St. Matthew's account of God's message to Joseph to reassure him that his fiancée's child is miraculously conceived by God. Joseph not only accepts this message, but understands it to be an instruction from God that he should take Mary as his wife, and so he "took her to his own home". Our Lady, who shields and nurtures God's Son in her womb in those nine months from His conception until His birth, herself needs protection. This role is given by God to St. Joseph who willingly takes on himself the care both of Mary and of her holy child.

THE WORD BECAME FLESH—HOPE IS BORN

On Christmas Day we celebrate the appearance on earth of God in our human nature. This is the "miracle of the Incarnation". For by becoming man, Jesus did not in any way cease to be God. Only insofar as He hid His glory and lived in great humility did He seem to disguise His Godhead. Yet even so we believe that to all those who accept Him in faith as the Son of God, Jesus reveals Himself as God—not yet in His full majesty and glory, but as the living sign of hope to the world in darkness. Christmas is celebrated in the darkness of the year in order to remind us that Christ has conquered darkness. For the darkness of the world around us in midwinter is a symbol of the inner darkness of our hearts and minds caused by sin. Only Christ can take that away from us—only He can enlighten us.



The best-loved Christmas Mass is, not surprisingly, the Midnight Mass, because it is the one that most seems to express the wonder of Christmas—the paradox of darkness and night-time which is shattered by the strange and wonderful light of the stable at Bethlehem. This light in the darkness also speaks to our innermost hearts of the hope that shatters the darkness of sin and despair. Even though human sorrow, which is no less real for so many at this time of the year, is not taken away, it is nonetheless lightened by the hope that Christ brings with Him at His coming. When Mary sees the face of God, her Son, for the first time, she rejoices beyond all human rejoicing in the history of the world, and she shares her joy with all those who come to her at Christmas time and pray for her help.

CHRISTMAS JOY— CONFESSION AND THE CRIB

Yet the "magic" of that holy midnight can remain with us if we want. We must prepare a place in our hearts and souls for Christ by making a good preparation for the feast. This requires a good and thorough confession. If we wish Christ to come into our hearts and Mary to share with us her joy at the birth of her Son, then we must empty our hearts of all the rubbish of sin and selfishness which leave no room for Him to enter. Just as Mary and Joseph found no room in the comfortable inn, but only in the poor stable for Christ to be born there, so too Christ will be born in us only if we are poor and humble of heart. If we want the joy of Christmas and its true meaning to fill the whole of this holy season, then give the Christmas Crib pride of place among all your decorations at home. Make a daily prayer before it, asking Mary to bring her Son into your heart and life, not just at Christmas but at all times. And remember the Christmas Crib collection here at Church, which we will be giving to those among us who, like Mary and Joseph at the first Christmas, find themselves far from home and in great need of help and comfort. St Stephen (1st c.) One of the first (seven) deacons chosen by the Apostles, Stephen was a renowned preacher but he was so successful that he was brought before the Sanhedrin. He gave impressive witness to Our Lord’s Divinity and, as a consequence, was sentenced to death by stoning. He was the first person to die for the Faith.

Thursday December 27th: *St John, Apostle & Evangelist, Feast. (White)*

St John (1st c.), the Evangelist, was the brother of James, and with St Peter, witnessed the Transfiguration. He was known as “the Beloved Disciple” and was particularly close to Our Lord due to his purity of heart, and understanding of Our Lord as God. For this reason, he is also known as “*The Divine*”, i.e. Theologian. He was chosen by Our Lord to care for Our Lady after the Crucifixion.

Friday December 28th: *The Holy Innocents, martyrs. Feast. (Red)*

- **All night Vigil commencing at 10 p.m. (Cloister Chapel) See below.**

The Holy Innocents (1st c.) We commemorate the children ordered by Herod to be murdered, due to his fear and hatred of Our Lord.

Saturday December 29th: *fifth Day within the Octave of Christmas. (White).*

Optional memoria of St Thomas à Becket, Priest & Martyr. (Red)

- **Mass at 8 a.m. and 11 a.m.**
- **Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 8.30 to 10.45 a.m.**
- **Benediction at 10.45 a.m.**

St Thomas à Becket (d. 1170) He was a London-born Norman who became Chancellor of England, and a friend and advisor to Henry II. Thinking it politically expedient, Henry appointed him Archbishop of Canterbury, but once in office, Thomas shunned worldly pursuits and strongly defended the Church over the State causing serious arguments with the King. He was martyred by four of Henry’s in Canterbury Cathedral.
