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November 9th 2008: THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA Remembrance Sunday



FOR THOSE KILLED IN WAR

It is a most unusual thing to celebrate a Requiem Mass on a Sunday, and especially when this Sunday is a special Feast: "The Dedication of the Lateran" (see below). But it is a sign of the importance of this "Remembrance" we make that the Church not only allows, but encourages us, to celebrate today a Solemn Mass for those killed in war.

The first thing to note is that those killed in war need our *prayers* more than our *praise*. The residual protestantism of this land, especially in the culture of the armed forces, concentrates on praising the heroism of those killed in armed conflict, because protestantism denies both the doctrine of Purgatory and the possi-

bility of praying for the dead "that they may be loosed from their sins". However, in the first reading at today's High Mass we will hear that passage from the Book of Macchabees in the Old Testament which speaks of the great Jewish leader, Judas Maccabaeus, who led a successful revolt against the pagans occupying power in the Holy Land and restored the worship of the God of Israel in Jerusalem. Although he and his army won the battle, many of his soldiers who died were found to have pagan "lucky charms" on their bodies when they were taken for burial. Judas Maccabaeus called for a sacrifice to be offered to God as a supplication on behalf of these fallen soldiers who had sinned, so that they should not be lost for ever. This means that Judas knew that there was hope for these sinners, even though they had died in sin; and also that the living could assist the dead in being rid of the effects of their sin. So the author of the Book of Macchabees comments at the end of today's first reading: "it is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins." This is our Catholic faith and understanding: We can help the souls of those who, though sinners, can still find God's mercy and be cleansed from their sins and the effect of sin which remains in their souls at death. Nobody knows how long souls remain in Purgatory. What "time" in that state between death and heaven is like is difficult for us to assess. Yet since Purgatory is a process in which sinful, yet forgiven, souls become holy and fit for God's presence, it must take "time" for that change to come about. This change will need to be greater in some souls than others, depending on many circumstances in their former lives on earth. Our prayers can assist them in undertaking this process. That is why it is a charitable and praiseworthy thing for us to have Masses offered, to offer our own prayers and sacrifices, especially during November, for the souls in purgatory—and in particular on this day for all those who died in war. They are most likely to have met death suddenly and without adequate spiritual preparation, just like those for whom Judas Maccabaeus had a sacrifice offered in Jerusalem.

THE POPE'S CATHEDRAL CHURCH

Today's feast known generally as the "Dedication of the Lateran Basilica" recalls the Dedication of the Pope's Cathedral Church in Rome, or, to give it its full title, the Archbasilica of Our Saviour and Sts. John the Baptist and John the Evangelist. It is popularly known as "the Lateran Basilica" after the noble Roman family of the "Laterani" who gave the land to Pope St. Silvester, the first Pope to reign after the end of the great centuries of persecution. Here the

Pope was at last able openly to establish his home and Cathedral Church.

Because a consecrated Church building is a symbol of Christ, and of His Body, the Church built up of living stones, this feast can take the place of an Ordinary Sunday, as it does today. In any diocese, the Cathedral is the Mother Church, because it is the place where the Bishop celebrates the Liturgy and from which he directs the local Church placed under his care by Christ, the Good Shepherd. In the case of the Cathedral of Rome, however, we are considering the Church from which the Bishop of Rome, the Pope, presides as Supreme Pastor over the entire Catholic world. The Lateran Basilica, the "Archbasilica of Our Saviour", is therefore a powerful sign of the unity of the Church on earth, focussed on the person successor of Peter, the Prince of the Apostles, upon whom Christ established the foundation and governance of His Church.

St Leo the Great (d. 461) Elected Pope in 440, he was a man of great ability. The Doctrine of the Incarnation with which we are familiar was formulated by him, and he declared the natures of Our Lord, manhood and divinity, united yet unmixed in His One Divine Person. Leo twice saved Rome from barbarian invasion, at one point, confronting Attila the Hun at the Gates of Rome when he was intent on sacking it, and persuading him to turn back.

Tuesday November 11th: St Martin of Tours, Bishop. Memoria. (White).

St Martin of Tours (c.316-97) A pagan officer in the Roman army in Pannonia (modern Hungary), he gave a beggar half of his cloak. Later, seeing a vision of Our Lord wearing it, he was converted. St Hilary, Bishop of Poitiers, assisted him in founding a monastery which is still in existence. He was appointed Bishop of Tours, though he remained a monk. He was known not only for his compassion and mercy, but also for his miracles.

Wednesday November 12th: St Josaphat, Bishop & Martyr. Memoria. (Red)

St Josaphat (1584-1623) A Polish monk in the Byzantine Rite, he devoted his life trying to unifying the Greek and Ukrainian Christians with the Holy See, but he was murdered by those who opposed unity between Rome and the Orthodox Church under the Pope.

St Albert the Great was a German who belonged to the earliest generation of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans) and both studied and taught in Paris and Cologne. He was a notable theologian and, most important for the subsequent development of science and learning, he was an outstanding student of natural science, basing his method on careful observation of facts and natural phenomena, and formulating penetrating questions for investigation and study. He was a great teacher and among his pupils was St. Thomas Aquinas. He was eventually appointed Bishop of Ratisbon in Southern Germany. He is a Doctor of the Church.
