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July 18th 2010: SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



MARTHA AND MARY

Today's Gospel tells us of the familiar yet also puzzling conversation between Our Lord and Martha concerning her sister Mary's apparent unwillingness to help with the preparations for the meal they are all about to eat together.

St. Luke tells us that Martha was "distracted" with all the serving and eventually comes to Our Lord burning with indignation and challenges Him to admonish Mary, "Lord, do you not care that my sister is leaving me to do all the serving by myself? Please tell her to help

It seems a reasonable request. Had Our Lord done as we would have thought was the reasonable and fair thing to do, and had asked Mary to help her sister, we should in all probability never have heard of this event. But in fact, as we know, Our Lord said something so extraordinary that it was written down and included in the Gospel: "Martha, Martha, you worry and fret about so many things, and yet few are needed, indeed only one..." What can He be about to say to

her? It is hard to guess what this "one necessary thing" can be. Then He finishes what He wants to say: "It is Mary who has chosen the better part; it is not to be taken from her."

Here is what Cardinal Newman has to say about this in one of His Anglican Sermons:

'Mary's portion is the better of the two. Our Lord does not expressly say so, but He clearly implies it. If His words be taken literally, they might, indeed, even mean that Martha's heart was not right with Him, which, it is plain from other parts of the Gospel, they do not mean. Therefore, what Our Lord intimated surely was that Martha's portion was full of snares, as being one of worldly labour, but that Mary could not easily go wrong in hers; that we may be busy in a wrong way, but we cannot well adore Him except in a right one; that to serve God by prayer and praise continually, when we can do so consistently with other duties, is the pursuit of the "one thing needful", and emphatically He says "that good part shall not be taken from us."

Another interesting "frequently asked question" is whether this Mary in today's Gospel, Martha's sister from Bethany, is the same person as Mary Magdalene, mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels as a close disciple of Our Lord's and as one from whom Jesus had driven out seven devils. There are different opinions. Most of the ancient Greek Fathers follow the accounts in St. Matthew's and St. Luke's Gospels and therefore believe that Mary of Bethany and Mary of Magdala were entirely different persons. Here in the West, however, the tradition has been to follow the indications in St. John's Gospel. St. John clearly identifies the anointing of Our Lord's feet with precious ointment as having been done by Mary, sister of Martha and Lazarus, at their home in Bethany. It is not totally clear why there are such apparent discrepancies between the Gospels though one interesting theory is that when St. Matthew and St. Luke wrote their Gospels, Mary was still alive and so those evangelists deliberately disguised her identity in the Gospel to spare her blushes. On the other hand, by the time St. John wrote His Gospel, the last of the New Testament writings as far as we can tell, Mary was long since dead and so no longer was it necessary to protect her from the embarrassment of being identified in this way.

This has interesting consequences for understanding today's Gospel passage. If this Mary is the same as the one who had been forgiven many sins in the reading from St. Luke's Gospel we heard at Mass on the eleventh Sunday last month, and as a consequence she loves Our Lord very much, then that explains her especial closeness to Our Lord which we hear about in today's Gospel. It also tells us that Our Lord's comment on her "choosing the better part" is in some way connected with her penitence, her sorrow for past sins. Our Lord clearly approves of this love and so He approves of the penitence that has inspired it. We can also remember this when we celebrate the feast of St. Mary Magdalene on Thursday this week.

St Apollinaris (1st Century) was reputed to be a native of Antioch who became Bishop of Ravenna in North Eastern Italy where he was martyred. He is patron saint of epileptics.

St Laurence of Brindisi (1559-1619) was a Capuchin Franciscan and a gifted linguist and biblical scholar who preached in most European countries, especially to Jews and Lutherans, eventually becoming Master General of his Order.

Thursday 22nd July: St Mary Magdalene. Memoria. (White).

St Mary Magdalene (see the front page on St. Mary of Bethany and St. Martha) according to the Gospels Mary of Magdala was set free by Our Lord from the power of seven devils, and was the first witness of the empty tomb before the risen Lord appeared to her in person and told her to announce the resurrection to the Apostles.

Friday 23rd July: St Bridget of Sweden, Patroness of Europe. Feast. (White)

St Bridget of Sweden (1303-73) had eight children, of whom one was also a saint (Katherine of Vadstena). After her husband's death she founded a religious order dedicated to the Holy Saviour, known popularly after her as the Bridgettines. She also lived some time in Rome caring for the poor and sick and even offering advice to the popes of her day concerning serious Church and political problems. She died in Rome after returning there from a pilgrimage to the holy Land.

He lived an austere life and spent the last twenty-fife years living as a hermit. In the Universal Calendar, he is a representative of Lebanese Catholics of the Maronite Rite.
