What makes a "Good" Shepherd?

People who know the Middle East well often say that you can't really appreciate the full force of Our Lord's parables, that is of His stories and His descriptions of the spiritual life taken from daily life, until you have seen how people actually live in the Holy Land. Today's teaching in the Gospel is a good example. Most of us have little direct experience and knowledge of sheep farming, and even if we did, the chances are that we would find our knowledge did not exactly correspond with what Our Lord says. For instance, a small detail perhaps, but a significant one, is the way in which Our Lord speaks of the shepherd leading his flock. Our shepherds usually follow behind the flock to prevent stragglers from getting lost, and rely on their sheepdogs to make sure the front runners of the flock go in the right direction. In order to understand better what Our Lord says about Himself as our shepherd, it is necessary to realise that He leads and we follow Him.

Our Lord also speaks of His sheep following Him "because they know His voice." He calls them "one by one", because He knows them all individually, by name. Our Lord says this to reassure us of His love for us all. He knows each one of us intimately. He knows our characters, our strengths and weaknesses, all our deeds. He knows when we go astray, and as He tells us in another part of the Gospel, He is prepared to leave the ninety-nine sheep who are safe, and go off in search for the missing one. You might think that having a hundred sheep, such a shepherd might not notice one missing, or maybe not even care too much. But no-He is prepared to go into the "wilderness", a perilous place, and expose Himself to difficulties and danger in order to ensure our rescue and safety whenever we have gone astray.

In today's Gospel Our Lord also speaks of "thieves and brigands" who attempt to steal the sheep by misleading them. Some

pose as leaders who wish to set the flock of Christ free from the "restraints" of His teaching, especially when this seems irksome. They seek to make themselves popular by telling people that they are free to do as they please, and not to be "hidebound" by awkward rules. Our Lord teaches us that not only are they false, but that "they have come only to steal and kill and destroy". For instance, those who tell people not to follow the Church's teaching, whether about marriage, or about human life, or about the unity of the Church under Christ's chosen earthly leader, the Pope. Then there are those shepherds who have sinned grievously and scandalously against Christ and His flock by abusing their position of trust. We know, of course that many people are misled in this way. Many have fallen away from their faith in recent years either because of bad teaching, or because of the terrible scandal of various kinds of sexual sin among priests.

So how can Our Lord say that the sheep are not fooled? How can we recognise the nuance of the true shepherd's voice and so not be deceived by the impostors? This can only by achieved by recognising that He is "the gate of the sheepfold". By this phrase He means that only by entering through Him, and going freely in and out under His safe guidance can we avoid being misled. By staying close to the one whom He has appointed as His "Supreme Pastor" on earth we can be sure of safety and of authentic teaching and direction. The Pope is the successor of St. Peter, whom Scripture and Tradition teach us Christ Himself chose to be the "rock on which He built His church" (Mt. 16: 18-19), who also would "strengthen His brethren" after the scandal of Christ's death (Lk. 22:32). It was also Peter whom Our Lord solemnly commanded, after His resurrection, to "feed my lambs and look after my sheep" (Jn. 21:15-20).

On this Sunday in Eastertide we pray for our Pastors, that they may indeed be "good shepherds" after the model of Christ Himself, and we contribute to the expense of forming those who will, we pray, be the good shepherds of the next generation of the Church's life, to guide us in His name through the difficulties and dangers of this life towards eternal life.
