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# **June 20th 2010: TWELFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**



## WHO DO YOU SAY I AM?

We are more familiar with the famous scene of today's Gospel in St. Matthew's version which we will hear once again in a few days' time on Ss. Peter's and Paul's Day. It is the  $\alpha$ -casion when Our Lord asked the Apostles "who do people say I am?" and they replied that the people thought He was John the Baptist or Elijah, or yet another of the great prophets of past times come back to life. When Our Lord then went on to ask them "who do YOU say I am?", it is Peter who answers, "You are the Christ!"

But whereas St Matthew then tells us what Our Lord said to Peter in reply, St. Luke omits Our Lord's words to Peter and goes on, first to recount His command that they keep silent about His true identity, and then His discourse about the cross which He will have to suffer, saying, "The Son of Man must suffer many things, and be rejected by the elders, and chief priests and scribes, and be killed," Yet this is not the end, for He rounds off this prediction by saying: that "on the third day [I will] be raised."

Why did Our Lord command silence before going on to predict His sufferings and resurrection? There are two reasons for this silence. First, it was so that His true path as the Christ, the Son of David and King of Israel, might not be mistaken for a glorious, worldly kingship. There were so many times in Our Lord's life when He had worked a great miracle and was about to be taken by force by the enthusiastic crowd to be their triumphant leader. Our Lord always resisted them. He knew that this path was not for Him, because it would not lead to our salvation. Only the way of suffering leads to the resurrection and everlasting life.

But there is a second reason, and it is no less signifi-

cant than the first. For Our Lord goes on to say not only to His Apostles, **but to everyone**: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me." These words are very difficult to accept. Remember how Peter remonstrated with Jesus about His prediction of the Passion, saying "God forbid that such things should happen to You, Lord!" But Our Lord rebuked Peter very sharply, for the way of the Cross is not only necessary for Himself as the Redeemer, but also for all those who wish to share in the victory of His Cross. This is what He meant when he said: "For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for my sake, he will save it". The way of the Cross is not attractive to us, yet it is the only way that we can reach victory over sin and death. Our Lord wants us to understand how not only His own sufferings win our redemption, but also how our own very different sufferings can become part of our journey into eternal life.

Monday 21st June: St Aloysius Gonzaga, Priest. Memoria. (Green); or St John June 27th: the Thirteenth Sunday of Rigby, English Martyr. (Red)

\*Holy Hour 8 a.m.—9 a.m. \*Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.

St Aloysius Gonzaga (1568-91) Son of an Italian nobleman and soldier, he was expected to join the military but he abhorred violence and he joined the Jesuits at only 17. Many attested to his holiness as he cared for plague victims. He died aged 23.

St John Rigby (d. 1600) A layman from near Wigan, he had occasionally 'conformed' by attending protestant services, but repented and was responsible for several conversions. Caught and sentenced, he declared his loyalty to the Queen but added: "If it be treason to be reconciled to God, God's will be done." He was hanged drawn & quartered.

Tuesday 22nd June: Sts John Fisher and Thomas More, English Martyrs. Feast. (Red)

\*Holy Hour 8 a.m.—9 a.m. \*Sung Mass at 5.45 p.m. \*Benediction at 8 p.m.

**St John Fisher** (1459-1535) Bishop of Rochester and friend of Thomas More, he was the only one of the Catholic English bishops who refused to take the Oath of Supremacy, or to acknowledge Henry VIII's divorce from Catherine of Aragon. He was elevated to Cardinal by the Pope, who hoped to ease the King's treatment of Fisher, but it had the reverse effect on the proud king. St Thomas More (1478-1535) Henry VIII's very good friend and adviser until the fall-out over Henry's divorce and the Oath of Supremacy, said that he "...died the King's good servant, but God's first". They were both beheaded.

Wednesday 23rd June: Feria. (Green). Optional Memorias of St Ethelreda, Abbess. (White); or of **St Thomas Garnet**, English Martyr. (Red)

\*Holy Hour 8 a.m.—9 a.m.

St Ethelreda (d. 679) An Anglos-Saxon princess and twice widowed before joining a convent, she founded a double monastery at Ely.

**St Thomas Garnett** (d. 1608) As a secular priest, he was imprisoned for nine months and then left to join the Jesuits at Louvain. Determined to minister in England, he returned but was soon caught and charged for being a priest. Like many of the martyrs he was offered freedom and even riches if he signed the Oath of Supremacy, and his refusal resulted in his being hanged, drawn and quartered.

TIMETABLE CHANGES: The Fathers are thinking of making some changes to the timetable of services at the Oratory and would like to hear your views before we come to any decisions.
