

March 23rd 2008: EASTER DAY



"I have risen and am still with you!" Alleluia!

These words which begin the Entrance Antiphon at Mass on this Day of the Resurrection come from psalm 138, which figures greatly in the liturgy of Easter night. It is a psalm which speaks of God's most intimate knowledge and love of us in all circumstances. Wherever we go, whatever we suffer, we cannot be outside God's all-embracing sight. Applied to our Lord, these words of course indicate the drama and contrast of His death and resurrection, and can be understood as a prayer addressed by the Son to His heavenly Father: "You know my lying down and my rising up" (v.2), and "If I sleep in Sheol (the world of the dead) you are there, and if I ascend to the heavens, you are there" (v.8). For when our Lord died on the cross, His soul was sundered from His body. While His body was buried in the tomb, His soul went, not to heaven, but as St. Peter tells us in his first epistle, "Christ...being put to death in the flesh [was] made alive in the spirit, in which He went and preached to the spirits in prison." (1 Peter 3:18-19)

This is the meaning of those words in the Apostles' Creed that can seem so strange to us: "He descended into hell". "Hell" in this sense is not the dwelling-place of Satan and the damned, but of those "spirits in prison" of whom St. Peter speaks, the souls of all those who had ever lived and died before Christ's coming as the Redeemer. For it is most important to remember that before the death and resurrection of Christ, no human person was in heaven. Even good men and women, like the Patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses and countless others, though they had faith in God and had lived in accordance with His laws and commandments, nevertheless could not go to heaven when they died, because of Adam's sin, in which they and all mankind share. So they were in a state apart from God, though not eternally damned. This state is what the Old Testament Jews called "Sheol", the dark underworld of dead souls.

Thus the psalmist says: "If I say, 'let only darkness cover me, and the light about me be night', even the darkness is not dark to You, the night is as bright as day; for darkness is as light with You!" (ps. 138: v. 11-12) This phrase was sung at the Easter night-time Vigil in the Exultet, the wonderful chant in which the Deacon joyfully proclaimed the Resurrection of Christ to the congregation in the darkened Church, lit by the light of the Paschal Candle which dispels the darkness of night and death, and sheds the bright ray of God's life and light. This is why we celebrate the Resurrection, at first sight oddly enough, at night time in the darkness—so that the light of Christ's resurrection may be seen to scatter the darkness of death. Christ rising from the dark tomb and returning from Sheol is symbolised by the Paschal Candle which now burns in a prominent place in the Sanctuary for the whole of Eastertide.

So it was necessary that Christ should die and that His soul should enter the dark world of the dead so as to "preach to them in prison" and bring them freedom from Adam's sin. Yet redemption was not complete until His body and soul were reunited at the resurrection. It was not until after the Resurrection that the holy and just souls of all the dead could enter heaven in the company of the glorified Lord Jesus. So when Our Lord on the cross promised Paradise to the repentant thief, this was not yet what we call "heaven". It was a state of bliss in immediate preparation for the heaven which even Christ's soul did not enter immediately after His own death. Moreover, until our bodies have risen again on the last day, even in heaven we will not yet be completely what Our Lord intends us to be. For without our bodies our human nature is not complete. Our Lord's Resurrection reminds us of the vital truth that we are made not to become "disembodied souls" as some pagan religions believe, set free from bodily matter. Nor will our risen bodies be simply a resumption of these we have now, but they will be glorified in a way that the Resurrection of Jesus shows us - surpassing the limits of time and space.
