

ARREST THE POPE?

Last Monday's "Times" newspaper carried an article on p. 23 by the self-styled "*Deist and Cradle Catholic, albeit long alienated*" journalist and broadcaster, Libby Purves, entitled: "**Arrest the Pope? I rather think we should**".

This arose from the recent announcement by two fanatical atheists, Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens, that they intend to try and have the Pope arrested and put on trial for "Crimes against humanity", should he have the effrontery to set foot in this country next September. Dawkins is the author of a book entitled "The God Delusion"; and Hitchens once presented a television documentary in which he strove to persuade us that Mother Teresa of Calcutta was some kind of evil right-wing political ogress.

Nobody should be shocked to learn that these ranters have said something extreme against the Pope, any more than you should be taken aback to be told that penguins have been seen walking around the Antarctic. But as for Libby? What does she mean when she says: "I *rather* think we should" arrest the Pope? Can you imagine anyone saying of a mass murderer, "I *rather* think we should arrest him"? Come off it, Libby! If someone is a criminal, or is suspected of being one, then he (or she) *ought* to be arrested and tried—no "*rather*" about it. I can only conclude that Libby is *rather* doubtful about the rightness of the whole thing but is still happy to climb onto the anti-Pope bandwagon.

So what is driving this bandwagon? The heart of it is the Pope's allegedly trying to protect all the paedophile priests in the world. Yet in fact he has been responsible more than any one else in the upper levels of the hierarchy for identifying and then dealing with this problem. As Cardinal Ratzinger, shortly before he was elected Pope, he spoke very forthrightly about priests who had abused their sacred trust in this hateful way, as having brought "filth" into the Church. Now some journalists have attempted to show that back in 1985 Cardinal Ratzinger tried to hush such an abuse case up to protect the Church's reputation. But this is based on a misreading of the document. It's not surprising if journalists misunderstand such documents, since few of them know Canon Law, or are fluent in Latin. This letter (signed by Cardinal Ratzinger) deals only with the matter of *a priest who had already been removed from active ministry, convicted and sent to prison*. The reference in the letter to the Church's reputation addresses the scandal of too many priests being summarily laicised (i.e. having their priestly orders and duties taken from them and returning to the lay state), while many lay people at the same time could not so easily find dispensation from their marriage vows.

But why should people want to misrepresent and attack the Pope? It's very simple. They want to neutralise the Pope's authority to speak out on moral issues. And it's not just Catholics who support the Pope who say this. Here's what the famous Jewish former Mayor of New York, Ed Koch, said about the affair this week: "*I believe the continuing attacks by the media on the Roman Catholic Church and Pope Benedict XVI have become manifestations of anti-Catholicism. The procession of articles on the same events are, in my opinion, no longer intended to inform, but simply to castigate*".

How does he explain the abuse? "*The primary explanation for the abuse that happened - not to excuse the retention of priests in positions that enabled them to continue to harm children - was the belief that the priests could be cured by psychotherapy, a theory now long discarded by the medical profession. Regrettably, it is also likely that years ago the abuse of children was not taken as seriously as today. Thank God we've progressed on that issue*".

And the attack on the Church? "*Many of those in the media who are pounding on the Church and the Pope today clearly do it with delight, and some with malice. The reason, I believe, for the constant assaults is that there are many in the media, and some Catholics as well as many in the public who object to and are incensed by positions the Church holds, including opposition to all abortions, opposition to gay sex and same-sex marriage, retention of celibacy rules for priests, exclusion of women from the clergy, opposition to birth control measures involving condoms and prescription drugs and opposition to civil divorce. The Church has the right to demand fulfilment of all of its religious obligations by its parishioners, and indeed a right to espouse its beliefs generally*". These are indeed wise words! Please pass them on to all who are understandably worried or confused by what is happening to the Church and the Pope in these days.

St Anselm (d.1109) An influential theologian and philosopher and an Italian Abbot in a Norman Monastery, he was invited by William II to be Archbishop of Canterbury, but his battles with the crown over its attempts to rule the Church led to periods of exile. He was a renowned also for his spirituality, sensitivity, generosity and his great work in the ordination of native Englishmen, and in fighting against slavery.

St George: He was martyred during the Diocletian persecutions, probably in Palestine. Venerated there from early times, his popularity here spread during the Crusades.

St Adalbert of Prague (956-997) preached in Poland, Hungary and Russia converting thousands, and was styled "Apostle of the Slavs". He was martyred near Danzig.

St Fidelis of Simarigen (1577-1622) A German lawyer he became known as the "Advocate of the Poor" but found his true vocation as a Capuchin. He became a missionary in Switzerland but his great success worried the ruling Calvinists and they invented the story that he was an Austrian spy which led to his murder.
