ADVENT

When people think about "The End of the World", if they do, they tend to imagine that it will be ushered in with a gradual crescendo of violent and dramatic signs both in the world of nature and in the human world as our Lord said in the Sunday Gospel a fortnight ago: "Nation will fight against mation...there will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven." Clearly such things are already with us as Our Lord says: "When you hear of these things do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen, but the end is not so soon." In fact, Our Lord in today's Gospel goes so far as to warn us that when He does return people will still be "eating, drinking, taking wives and husbands...and suspecting nothing". Advent comes round once again in order to

remind us of the vital truth that Our Lord speaks of in today's Gospel: "stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect". He uses a simple but effective image when he says: "if you had known the time the burglar was going to arrive at your house, you wouldn't choose that time to be out, would you?" So, therefore, we must be as ready at all times to meet Our Lord as we would hope to be if we wanted to outwit any prospective burglar. A burglar won't announce in advance that he is coming, so neither will Our Lord!

OUR LADY CONCEIVED WITHOUT SIN

Next Saturday we celebrate our patronal feast of the Immaculate Conception of our Lady. God kept her free from sin by the merits of her Son-to-be, so that she could be truly free to accept His invitation to be the Mother of God, and so that she might be the most perfect educator of her Son as He "grew in wisdom and in favour with God and man" (Luke 2:52). So please do come to Mass next Saturday morning, (especially to the High Mass at 11 a.m.), and if possible to the First Vespers on Friday evening at 7.30 p.m. Each other weekday evening at 8 p.m. we will continue our Novena of preparation for the feast, asking God's blessing, through Our Lady's prayers, on the Oratory here, on our Parish and on all who come here to worship Our Lord and honour His Blessed Mother.

THE GOLDEN COMPASS

Obviously more people must read this newsletter than we realise, because the last time I wrote about Philip Pullman it was reported in the papers! Many of you will be aware that a new film adaptation of Pullman's "His Dark Materials" trilogy is out in the cinemas this week. We have been warned by friends in the States that the film has been made in such a way as to make parents and children want to get the books. Pullman has made no secret of the fact that he has modelled his trilogy on Tolkien and C.S. Lewis. But whereas they were Christian writers, even if not overtly Christian in all their writings, Pullman hates their work and has declared that it is his aim to undermine the foundations of Christian belief. Now I personally have no difficulty in facing Pullman's assault on faith. There have been many greater minds and writers than he who have attempted to "undermine the foundations of Christian belief". They have gone to meet their Maker and win whatever reward they have earned for their pains. They have all been answered by greater and holier minds than theirs, as well as by the profound yet simple faith of the ordinary Christian, which is more than adequate to meet these attacks. But whereas most adults might see through the artifice of Pullman's fiction, children do not necessarily find it so easy to do. I would urge everybody not to go to see this film, or any of its successors, for fear that they stain and darken the imagination and plant ideas that sap the faith of the young and as yet unformed soul and mind. Pullman's books have not been as great a success as he and his ilk would have liked, which is why they are "puffing" this film so energetically. It is no surprise that his books are nothing like as appealing as Tolkien's and Lewis's, for theirs end with hope and joy, but his end in despair and darkness masquerading as freedom from "religion" and what he calls "God". So give it a wide berth and thumbs down! Spend your precious time and money on better things.

Monday December 3rd: St Francis Xavier, Priest. Memoria. (White)

• Novena before the Immaculate Conception at 8 p.m.

St Francis Xavier (1506-22) A Basque nobleman, he met Ignatius Loyola while they were at University in Paris, and they were among the founding group of seven who founded the Jesuits in 1534. Francis was sent to the Far East as a missionary and on the way spent time in Mozambique, India, the Philippines and Japan, converting several thousand over ten years despite great difficulties and opposition. He set out for China but died on the island of Sancion, just short of his destination.

Tuesday December 4th: Tuesday of Advent Week 1. (Purple). Optional memoria of St John Damascene, Priest & Doctor of the Church. (White)

• Novena before the Immaculate Conception at 8 p.m. Brothers of the Little Oratory meet after Devotions

St John Damascene (c.679-749) He succeeded his father as the Christian representative at the Caliph's Islamic court in Damascus, but as soon as he could, retired to a monastery in Jerusalem. A theologian, he set his mind to the great debate of whether it was against the First Commandment to have sacred images and he strongly defended their use as holy objects and aids to prayer, a teaching later confirmed by the Second Council of Nicea. He had a deep devotion to Our Lady and wrote many hymns and sermons in her honour.

Wednesday December 5th: St Birinus, Bishop. (White)

• Novena before the Immaculate Conception at 8 p.m.

St Birinus (d. c.650) Born in Germany, he became a priest then Bishop in Italy. In 634, Pope Honorius I sent him on a mission to England where he preached to the West Saxons and quickly converted King Cynegils and so many followed. The king gave him the area of Dorchester on Thames where he established his see. He built many churches and St Bede said that "He called many by his holy labours".

Thursday December 6th: Thursday of Advent Week 1. (Purple). Optional memoria of St Nicholas, Bishop. (White)

• Novena before the Immaculate Conception at 8 p.m.

St Nicholas (d. c.350) The original *Santa Claus*, (i.e. "Sant Niklaus") he has been popular from early times, though little is known of him other than the fact that he was Bishop of Myra in Turkey. He has been adopted as patron of children, merchants, pawnbrokers, sailors and prisoners amongst others.

Friday December 7th: St Ambrose, Bishop & Doctor of the Church. (White)

• FIRST VESPERS OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION at 7.30 p.m.

St Ambrose (c.340-397) A lawyer and popular Governor of Milan, a dispute which he was asked to settle led to his call as Bishop, despite still being under instruction. However, he was to become one of the greatest Bishops in Church history. He was a profound theologian but simple preacher. He championed the poor and oppressed, and brokered peace between neighbours, even on behalf of his enemies.
