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May 16th 2010: SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION



CHRIST IN HEAVEN AND ON EARTH

Our Risen Lord's triumphant journey to heaven in the presence of His disciples is recorded in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, and in the Acts of the Apostles. In the Acts, St. Luke tells us that this event took place after Our Lord had remained on the earth for forty days after His resurrection, during which time He continued to prepare them for the Kingdom of God and for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The fortieth day after Easter was, of course, last Thursday, which in many places is still celebrated as Ascension Day. Nowadays we keep this feast today, on the nearest Sunday to the fortieth day after Easter.

The Ascension has many important things to teach us. First of all, it is the event in which our human nature has at last entered heaven. Until Our Lord became man, all human beings who ever lived were unable to go to live in God's presence in heaven at the end of their earthly lives. It was the common belief of most people in the ancient world that any life after death was, at best, a rather "shadowy" kind of existence. The Hebrews called this afterlife "Sheol", and it was more akin to a living death than to real life. Then Our Lord came as the Redeemer and Saviour of all mankind. He alone was able to open the gates of heavenly life to mankind. He did this by His own life, death, resurrection and ascension into heaven. Where He has gone before us, we hope finally to be able to follow Him, if we are faithful.

Secondly, The Ascension teaches us something about Our Lord's

continuing presence on earth, even now. For His departure would, at first sight, seem to be a sad occasion. Yet St. Luke tells us that the Apostles, after witnessing the Ascension, went back to Jerusalem rejoicing. How is this possible? Well, they had heard Our Lord say to them immediately before His leaving them: "Behold, I am with you always, even until the end of the world." How would Our Lord be able to be "with them always" while He was leaving them for heaven? To understand this we can think about the way that a very wise Pope once put it. St. Leo the Great said that after His Ascension into heaven, everything that had been in Our Lord's human nature here on earth had now passed into the Sacraments.

Now it is only possible for the Sacraments to be the living presence of Our Lord here on earth because the Holy Spirit is at work within them. It is the Holy Spirit who makes the water of baptism able to cleanse our souls as well as our bodies. It is the Holy Spirit who gives grace and strength to us in the oil of anointing at Confirmation. It is the Holy Spirit who by His divine power changes the bread and wine into our Lord's living Body and Blood in Holy Mass and Communion.

As Our Lord said to His Apostles during the Last Supper: "It is good for you that I am going away; because if I do not go, the Holy Spirit cannot come". We might have wondered why the coming of the Holy Spirit was so important until we realise that the Spirit makes Our Lord present in His Church's Sacraments.

PREPARING FOR PENTECOST

Since the coming of the Holy Spirit is so important for the life of the Church, we can begin to see why the Feast of Pentecost is so central to the Church's year. Pentecost, which means the "fiftieth day" after Easter, falls next Sunday. Our holy Mother the Church encourages us all to get ready to celebrate the feast, not as a mere memorial of a past event, but as a yearly renewal of the life of the Holy Spirit in each of us and in the Church as a whole family. To this end we invite you to take part in the Evening Service of prayer and praise each weekday evening this week, to prepare for Pentecost.

Monday this week is also the beginning of the Novena for the Feast of our holy Father St. Philip, which is on Wednesday next week, 26th May. Please join the Fathers in praying to St. Philip for the welfare of the Oratory here in Birmingham, especially as we approach the momentous day of the beatification of St. Philip's disciple, Cardinal Newman, our founder.
