February 24th 2008: The Third Sunday of Lent



The Journey to Jerusalem: The Samaritan Woman

Today's Gospel is the first of three long passages taken from St. John's Gospel, dealing with three elements of Baptism: water, light and life. Today's Gospel explores the theme of water. Next Sunday we will hear about light and seeing, and the following Sunday will recount the Raising of Lazarus, which takes us to the heart of life itself. These three Gospels prepare us both for the Passion Gospel according to St. Matthew on Palm Sunday, and for the Easter Vigil when we will once again celebrate the Sacraments of new life, Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion of Adult converts, in the light of the Resurrection.

Today we accompany Our Lord on His journey towards Jerus alem as He stops by a well outside a Samaritan village one day at noon. He sits down, weary from the journey and the heat of the day, when a woman of the village comes to draw water. Being thirsty, our Lord asks her to give Him a drink of water. She is amazed because, as St. John explains, Jews and Samaritans have nothing to do with each other. So for a Jewish man to ask a Samaritan woman for a drink from her vessel is most irregular. But this is only the opening to a conversa-

tion in which Our Lord uses the imagery of water to explain to her the gift of faith, which He is offering to give her.

The connection between water and faith, with which we are already familiar in the Sacrament of Baptism, is also the reason why we hear a reading today from the Book of Exodus. We hear how the people of Israel, during their forty-year long journey through the wilderness to the Promised Land, were tormented by thirst and grumbled against Moses and God for bringing them out of Egypt. Moses therefore prayed to God, who instructed him to strike the hard rock with his staff, so that water might flow out to slake the people's thirst. Yet although God saved the people in this way, He was displeased with them because they had not put their trust in Him and in Moses, His chosen leader.

But returning to our Lord's conversation with the Samaritan woman;—this takes place on two "levels". Our Lord is thirsty, both physically and spiritually. On one level He thirsts for a drink of water, and on another He thirsts for the woman's faith. So as on one level He asks her for a drink of water, on another level He also offers her "living water". But she takes His meaning in the literal sense. Our Lord then explains in greater depth the meaning of this "living water", which will spring up inside a person and never dry up. Again the woman takes this literally as she looks forward to never having to take the trouble to come and draw water from this well again. When Our Lord tells her to fetch her husband, she replies that she has no husband. Jesus answers that she is telling the truth, for having had seven husbands already, she is not married to her present "partner". By now, she has begun to realise that Jesus is no ordinary Jew. "I see you are a prophet, sir!", she says, and asks Him about the religious differences between His people and hers. Where is the proper place to worship God? Here in Samaria, or in Jerusalem? Our Lord replies that for the present the Samaritans worship God but do not know God. The time is almost come for a new form of worship; when all who worship God will know Him and when it will no longer be necessary to go to either Jerusalem or Samaria, but that anyone who worships God "in spirit and in truth" may do so anywhere.

The woman now turns to the coming of the Messiah who will make the truth about God known to Samaritans and Jews alike. Now the moment has come. She is now ready to hear the truth, and so our Lord says openly to her: "I who am speaking to you, I am He". Joyfully, she goes off to tell her neighbours about this wonderful man who has told her everything she ever did, and to invite them to meet Him and listen to His teaching. After hearing Jesus they all say to the woman, "It is no longer because of your words that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is indeed the Saviour of the world." In this wonderful reading, we learn how Jesus wins our faith by means of elements of ordinary human everyday experience such as thirst and water. Just as "man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from God's mouth", so too we do not live by water alone, but by the living spring of faith that alone makes our life worthwhile.

St Oswald Born in England of Danish nobility, and a nephew of St Odo, he put aside his wealth to join the Benedictines, studying under his uncle in France where he was ordained. He returned to England and only three years later was appointed Bishop of Worcester by (St) Dunstan. He identified himself with St Dunstan and St Ethelwold in working hard to eliminate the abuses, and to revive monastic life and ecclesiastical discipline in England. Retaining his see at Worcester, he was appointed Archbishop of York. In addition to striving to improve the morals of his clergy, he worked to increase their theological knowledge, writing two treatises and several synodal decrees. With St Dunstan and St Ethelwold, he has been revered since his death in 992, as one of the three saints who revived English monasticism.

St David: According to tradition, he was the son of King Sant of South Wales and St. Non. He was ordained a priest and later studied under St. Paulinus. He became involved in missionary work and founded a number of monasteries, including the monastery at Menevia, which was noted for its asceticism. In 550, he attended a synod at Brevi in Cardiganshire and his contributions at the synod are said to have been the major cause for his election as Bishop. He was reportedly consecrated archbishop by the patriarch of Jerusalem while on a visit to the Holy Land. He also is said to have invoked a council that ended the last vestiges of Pelagianism. He was known for his extraordinary spiritual leadership and many monasteries flourished as a result of his leadership and example. He was said to have performed miracles in his life-time. He died at his monastery in Menevia around the year 589.
