

COME DOWN, O LOVE DIVINE

When we think of God coming on the earth, we think, of course, of Our Lord, the co-eternal Son of the Father, becoming man in His Mother's womb and being born as a man like us in all things, sin alone excepted.

Yet this is not the whole truth about God coming to dwell with us. For although it is *only* the Son who comes down to earth *as a man,* the Holy Spirit also comes to us in ways that we may often overlook, simply because the Holy Spirit, being God, is invisible. Moreover, the Holy Spirit's coming to us on earth tends to be undemonstrative. In fact, the events of Pentecost, which we hear about in the First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles, are the exception rather than the rule where the coming of the Holy Spirit is concerned.

Even when the Coming of the Holy Spirit was accompanied by signs and wonders, as on the first Pentecost of the Christian era, even those signs were not "personal" as we understand the word: the assembled Apostles heard the sound of a mighty wind, they saw tongues resembling flames come to rest on their heads; but these "signs" do not put us in mind of a person at all. Even the image of the Dove (which plays no part in the account of Pentecost, but comes from Our Lord's Baptism) hardly suggests a "person", as we understand and use the word, much less a Divine Person, co-equal with the Father and the Son.

What is much more significant is the fact that the Apostles were then filled with understanding and courage. Before this they were hidden away "for fear of the Jews", and they had not fully understood our Lord's

teachings even when He left them on the day of the Ascension.

It was only with the coming of the promised gift of the Spirit that they were enabled to overcome these drawbacks. Moreover, as the Acts of the Apostles tells us, the Apostles then spoke about the "marvels of God" with great vigour and clarity and in many tongues to the vast numbers of people assembled from all parts of the world to celebrate the Jewish feast of Pentecost. Before this, men were divided from each other by their many languages. Now they were to be united in one Church and speak in one single language the truth about Christ and salvation.

Why doesn't He inspire us to speak any longer "in many tongues" as He inspired the Apostles? It is because the Church no longer needs those signs. After all, they were not the reality. The signs were given on that day to alert the Apostles to the beginning of a new era, an era which will last until Our Lord's Second Coming. From that moment when the Holy Spirit's coming was heralded by the sound of the wind and the tongues of fire, the Holy Spirit is continually poured out on the Church day by day wherever the Sacraments are celebrated. The Holy Spirit guarantees that we all share one single faith. No matter where we are born, or in what age, we share in the same faith as that which the Apostles preached on that first Pentecost Day in Jerusalem. It is the Holy Spirit who unites us in our proclamation of the Creed, so that we can all say: "I believe..." and know we mean the same thing.

Moreover, the Holy Spirit comes into our hearts, souls and minds as often as we pray to Him, so that He may inspire us with courage and wisdom. With these gifts of His, we can look at our particular circumstances, and make judgments about what God wants us to do in them. For instance, we live in a society which tends to discount, and even despise, our Catholic Christian faith. The Holy Spirit gives us a wisdom to judge what God wants us to do, and the courage to act accordingly despite any discouragement and opposition which we may have to face.

"Come, O Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of Your faithful, and kindle in them the fire of Your love."

NINTH WEEK OF ORDINARY TIME: Liturgical Calendar

Year 2 or B of the Lectionary at Mass and Psalter Week 1

Monday to Friday: Masses at 7.30 a.m., 8.30 a.m. (1962 Missal), 12.45 p.m. and 5.45 p.m. Rosary at 7.45 p.m. Benediction on Tuesday at 8 p.m. Exposition on Saturday: 8.30–10 45 a.m. Confessions are heard from 12.30 p.m. and from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass.

Monday 1st June: St Justin. Memoria. (Red).

• Blessing with St. Philip's relic at 8 p.m..

St Justin (c. 100-165) A Palestinian pagan, he converted after witnessing the heroism of the early martyrs. He studied the Scriptures and became the first great Christian philosopher, his writings being the most instructive that the Church posses from the second century. Records of his arrest and trial still exist; when he was ordered to make sacrifices to gods, he replied: "No right-minded man forsakes truth for falsehood."

Tuesday 2nd June: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Peter and St Marcellinus, Martyrs. (Red)

• Benediction at 8 p.m.

Sts Peter & Marcellinus (d. 303) Included in the Roman Canon of the Mass, both were martyred under the Emperor Diocletian. Peter was a priest, Marcellinus an exorcist.

Wednesday 3rd June: St Charles Lwanga & Companions, Martyrs. Memoria. (Red)

St Charles Lwanga & Comps (d 1885-87) Fr Charles was a White Father who undertook the care of converts who were at the court of the violent paedophile, King Mwanga. However, when the king was made aware that Fr Charles was keeping the young boys away from him, he gathered fifteen young catholic men (all under age 25) and ordered that they renounce their faith. None of them would do so and with Fr Charles, they were executed, almost all being burned alive. The proto-martyrs of Black Africa, we also remember the other Ugandan martyrs killed during Mwanga's reign.

Thursday 4th June: Feria. (Green)

Friday 5th June: St Boniface, Bishop & Martyr. Memoria. (Red).

• Benediction at 8 p.m. (in honour of the Sacred Heart every Friday in June)

St Boniface (675-754) From Crediton in Devon, he joined the Benedictines and was a teacher into his 40s before electing to go as a missionary to Germany where the faith was severely tried. He was appointed archbishop of Mainz and changed his name from Winfrith to Boniface. He was known as a lovable man who worked tirelessly and at 75, turned his missionary zeal towards Holland., but his camp was attacked and he and his companions were martyred. He is known as the Apostle of the Germans.

Saturday, June 6th: Our Lady on Saturday (White); or **Feria.** (Green); or optional memoria of **St Norbert,** Bishop. (White)

St Norbert (1080-1134) A German noble, an accident led to his conversion and he became a priest giving all his possessions to the poor. He became an itinerant preacher and in response to his earlier life, took the most difficult routes, even walking barefoot in the snow and ice. He was very successful, particularly in Northern France where he founded the *Premonstratensians* or *Norbertines*. Appointed Bishop of Magdeburg, his reforms led to attempted assassinations, but he was undeterred. He was particularly devoted to the Blessed Sacrament and for this reason, his emblem is a Monstrance.
