September 20th 2009: TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME



WELCOME, LORD!

Last week we heard in the Gospel how Our Lord began to prepare His Apostles for the terrible death of the Cross He was to endure. We heard then how Peter spoke up indignantly that this must not happen, and how Our Lord rebuked him most severely because *“the way you think is not God’s way, but man’s”*.

Today we hear how Our Lord once again foretold His bitter Passion to the Apostles, *“but”*, says St. Mark, *“they did not understand what He said and were afraid to ask Him.”* This is the background to what happened next. Shortly after this prediction the Apostles began to argue which of them was the greatest. This was another sign that, like St. Peter their leader, they had failed to grasp what Our Lord was saying. They were all expecting Him to be a glorious King and they, of course, would be His right hand men, the leaders of the people, respected and looked up to with awe by all.

Hence Our Lord’s response was to say to them, *“If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.”* To show them what He meant even more graphically He took a child and told them, *“Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me, and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the One who sent me!”*

Our Lord was especially fond of little children, not in a sentimental way, but for their simplicity, trustfulness and innocence. These qualities, He says, are not only precious in children but also in adults. Yet it is rare to find them in those who have grown up and been to some extent corrupted by the world and its *“false ware and magic coffers”* (as Cardinal Newman puts it). Still, these are qualities that we ought to strive to develop or recover by grace. Those who do live in a state of childlike trustfulness in God’s providence are especially close to Our Lord. The Apostles, (St. John was an exception because he retained this childlike simplicity and innocence all his life), had to relearn it in adult life, but they did so by God’s grace. We, too, can do the same by prayer and the Sacraments.

FORTY HOURS

Our annual celebration of the Forty Hours is only just over a fortnight away, beginning on Tuesday October 6th and ending on Thursday 8th. During that time the Blessed Sacrament will be almost continuously exposed on the High Altar for our adoration, prayer and praise. Please make a note in your diaries now and look out next week for the list at the back of church where we ask everyone to sign up for half an hour’s silent prayer, to make sure that Our Lord is never left alone. Of course, nobody need think that they should only come for one half hour period! It is a wonderful opportunity to come to Mass and to stay on for a little while, maybe ten, maybe fifteen or twenty minutes or even longer as you can manage. But please do come. There is so much to pray for and we all need to deepen our awareness of the wonder of Christ’s real presence in our tabernacles and on our Altars in the Blessed Sacrament.

Please also note that candles to be burned on the Sanctuary during the three days’ devotion (about a hundred are lit around the Monstrance in which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed) will be available to buy from today in the Cloisters. It is a special offering which we can make in supplication for a loved one or a special intention. A candle can burn on the Sanctuary when we are not able to be present as a sign of our spiritual offering and of our willingness to take part at all times in the adoration of our Saviour.

Monday 21st September: St Matthew, Apostle & Evangelist. Feast. (Red)

- **Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.**

St Matthew was a tax collector named Levi when Our Lord called him to be one of the twelve apostles. His Gospel, the first, was written for his fellow countrymen in their native Aramaic and is thought to have been written c. 40-50 AD. Its description of the Holy City with its temple still standing, indicates that it was, in any case, written before its destruction by the Romans in 70 AD. He is thought to have been martyred in Egypt or Persia.

Tuesday 22nd September: Feria. (Green)

Wednesday 23rd September: St Pio of Pietrelcina, Priest. Memoria. (White)

St. Pio (1887-1968) 'Padre Pio' was born Francesco Forgione, of Italian peasant farmers. He joined the Capuchins in Morcone when only fifteen and was ordained a priest at age twenty-two. In 1918, whilst praying he received the Stigmata, the first priest ever to do so, and the blood from the marks was said to have had the odour of roses. He was sought as a confessor by thousands and he could see into penitents souls. He also performed miracles of healing and could levitate and bilocate. He was canonised in 2002.

Thursday 24th September: Our Lady of Walsingham. Memoria. (White)

- **High Mass and Procession at 7.30 p.m. Celebrant Bishop Pargeter (see below)**

According to tradition, in 1061 Richedelis de Faverches was instructed at Walsingham by Our Lady to build a replica of the house at Nazareth where the Annunciation took place. The original shrine was destroyed during the Reformation in Henry VIII's reign.

St Cosmas and St Damian (d.303) Twins from Arabia, they were physicians who gave their services free to the poor. They were highly esteemed at Egaea in Cilicia, where they lived, but their prominence led to their arrest during the Diocletian persecutions. The church erected to their honour in Rome is one of the earliest still in existence.
